Work is currently underway on the property to add 17 accommodation units and building improvements to the existing pub.

The following provisions will come into effect on 1 July 2018:

- Mandatory Microchipping which will apply to all dogs (including current generations).
- Mandatory Desexing which will apply to all dogs born after 1 July 2018.

LCDTA Inc. update:

Recently another LCDTA project has been completed, namely the second BBQ shelter in the North Laura Parklands. Since completion, it has been used frequently which is great to see.

Over many years the LCDTA committee, along with community members, have been involved in an incredible number of town projects, with a good percentage of the funds required being sourced from our local fundraising efforts. Local businesses have been engaged where and whenever possible and we have also received good support from Northern Areas Council, whether it be from funding, assistance with grants or in-kind support.

As we have many new residents in the area, we thought this would be a good opportunity to share with everyone information and history about some past and upcoming projects.

Part 1 - North Laura Parklands



The development of the North Laura Parklands commenced in 2001. Previously the vacant land was cropped as a fundraiser by community groups but was made available to LCDTA by the Northern Areas Council. The Parklands was designed to be a central area in

town for the local community and visitors to enjoy for recreation and relaxation; the basic plan being an area to be enjoyed by young and old, with a playground and BBQ area to be used by families.

The first major project was the installation of the playground equipment, at a cost of \$11,000, closely followed by the Rose Arbour and paving. In 2002 mounds of soil were carted and developed to create an amphitheatre with approx. 4,000 tonne of soil carted for the project, (the cost of this work is unknown as it was work-in-kind). In 2002 irrigation was laid for the lawn area, Furphy heritage lighting installed and the toilet block with wheelchair access completed. All of these improvements totalled \$50,000.

Our first BBQ shelter with 2 electric BBQ's was built in 2003, this was also the year we saw the development of the car park and installation of bollards. In 2004 we installed shade sails over the playground, which was fantastic for families using the area in the heat of summer, and in 2008 & 2011 further playground equipment was added. Also in 2011 was the development of the skate park. Over the 8 year period, we spent \$131,000 on these projects.

With the help of financial assistance from local groups and community funds, in 2012 we installed a fence around the playground to help ensure the safety of the children. The second BBQ shelter commenced in 2016.

It is estimated that an extra \$40,000 would have been easily spent on incidentals such as trees, roses and shrubs; seating and tables; and many other small items over time.

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This brings the total money spent at the park to \$267,000 without including the value of volunteer hours spent carrying out the projects.

The development of the North Laura Parklands has been very positive for the Town and is an area which is used by the local community on a regular basis, but better still it's used by a large number of visitors. It is very pleasing to see tour buses stop frequently to eat their lunch and use the facilities, and quite often they walk down the street and spend some money with our businesses.

The playground and skate park are constantly in use, a popular gathering point for young mothers. The BBQ areas are not only popular for visitors but also for local birthday parties as a safe area for young families. The rose arbour has become a popular place for outdoor weddings, with over a dozen held there since its construction. The park has also become the venue to hold the annual Christmas party, with generally over 100 people attending this event each year.

As you can see, many hours and much money have been spent in the parkland area but many other projects have also been completed by the LCDTA committee and volunteers in the same time period. These projects will be the subject of our next article in the October newsletter.

The LCDTA strategic plan includes new exciting projects but we must also maintain past improvements. To maintain and continue the great work of past and current volunteers requires many hands. If you would like to help us continue this work, here are some of the tasks waiting to be completed;

- Re-oil rose arbour at North Parklands
- Repaint Golden North Sign at north end of town
- Repaint 'Laura' Railway sign
- Install fencing at Courthouse Art Gallery
- Revitalise median strip gardens
- Repair roof cladding on median strip gazebo
- Relocate garden tubs from front of Creative Treasures
- Sand and re-oil tables in median strip
- Paint bollards in North Parklands
- Repair damaged cladding on Toilets in North Parklands
- Re-paint seating in North Parklands playground

Then and Now: Aspects of North Laura:

As we observe the exciting motel development at the North Laura Hotel it is timely to look across the road. Observant people may have noticed that the old Mill site has been tidied up somewhat. Whilst the future of this site is still undecided, we can hope that some of the basic structure can survive. Laura has already lost some of its significant heritage structures; the old Town Hall, the Beetaloo Reservoir Hotel, the original Booyoolie District Council Office and more recently the Railway Station.


The Laura flour mill was built in 1874 for HWA Walter, after whom the streets of North Laura were named. Flour mills were notoriously risky for burning down. That happened in 1878. The mill was rebuilt and passed into the ownership of GE Walter who installed new machinery in 1893. It was reported as "only the second in the Colony" to be a complete Roller Mill.

After 1911 the mill was closed for a while before being purchased by the Kleinig family, trading as Laura Milling Co, and reopened the following year after extensive alterations with TA Kleinig as Manager. In 1924 a Bronze Medal was awarded in the British Empire Exhibition for the Laura flour.

The Laura Milling Company was well known for its BEST Laura Flour that "enjoyed the largest sales of any mill in the state for mills of a similar capacity". Flour and other products were supplied to Kingoonya, Broken Hill, Darwin and Mt Isa making extensive use of rail transport and even camel trains.

In 1960 major improvements included the installation of bulk handling facilities. The mill finally ceased production in 1972, but continued to process flour for specialized markets. The Laura mill was for many years the sole supplier of special high protein flour to the missions and settlements of Aboriginal communities of Central Australia.

The mill has been a significant part of life in Laura providing employment for generations, often working three shifts over 24 hours.

After the Second World War there were two trains daily from Adelaide to Gladstone with connections to Laura on the Wilmington line. That meant that there were also two mail deliveries daily.

During the 1960s with the introduction of the Bluebird Railcars, a new schedule was introduced whereby one could leave home early in the morning and arrive at Adelaide Railway Station around 11am. After spending some time in Adelaide before departing at 5pm arrival back at Laura was at 9.50 pm having changed to a narrow gauge Brille Railcar at Gladstone.

CREATIVE TREASURES

On July 4th 1992, Creative Treasures was officially opened for trading as a Christian Gift Shop at 42 Herbert Street Laura. Gradually over the years, our stock increased and we also began selling local crafts and home products.

In 1998, Creative Treasures moved into a new home at the site of the former ANZ Bank building. During the next 19 years, we developed quite a strong customer base, locally and further afield. Visitors from Adelaide and interstate would often call in on their travels through the area. Many made it a regular stop.

Creative Treasures was a popular place for plants, biscuits, jams, relishes and especially on Fridays for home baked goodies as well as Bibles, books, cards and gifts.

Known by many as the "God Shop", Creative Treasures has been fully staffed by volunteers. Over the 25 years, many people have given generously of their time to keep the doors open at least five days a week. Their volunteering has been greatly appreciated. A few folks have had a long association with the shop.

On April 28th 2017, the doors to Creative Treasures closed for the final time.

During the years, Creative Treasures has gifted its profits to various causes. As we finalise the bookwork, the volunteers have nominated Uniting Care Wesley, Laura Folk Fair, Rocky River Schools Ministries Support Group, Samaritans Purse, Minda Home Inc., Royal Flying Doctors and a project at the Laura Hospital as beneficiaries of our surplus funds.

Tourism and Wind Turbines:

At a recent Wirrabara Producers Market, I was talking to a Melrose B&B owner who said they had been flat out for the last two years with the surge in tourism to the region. Confidence is high and investment in new accommodation and tourism is evident, driven by cycling and environmental activities and experiences such as those being offered by the revival of the Jacka Bros Brewery (Flinders News July 19th). People really are getting out more.

Elon Musk cited the new battery installation on the Hornsdale wind farm as a tourist attraction too, but this has to be taken in balance with surveys on tourism and wind farms over recent years in other places.

A YouGov survey in Britain cited on the webpages of The John Muir Trust, a body deeply involved with the protection of Scottish countryside, stated, "43% of people in Britain who visit scenic areas in the UK for their natural heritage and beauty would be "less likely to visit a scenic area with a large concentration of wind farms."

The Daily Mail, in an article about Scottish tourism and wind farms says, "Two thirds of those surveyed say they have been put off visiting Scotland by wind farms – and will not revisit places they have already visited where turbines now exist...The evidence from this, and other surveys, suggests that visitors dislike them more and more as they cease to be a novelty."

Due to their involvement with the new battery, NEOEN has told us that they are revising their timelines for the Crystal Brook Energy Park. It still looms over the residents of Crystal Brook and Beetaloo who are concerned about its effects on our district's tourism.

Rarely does a day pass without seeing cars loaded with bikes go through this district. Getting more trails through the hills around Laura and joining them up with the Wirrabara Forest will be more productive than covering this beautiful countryside with 220 metre high wind turbines as illustrated by this photomontage of Hughes Gap from Prior's Hill.
