The weekend was action-packed for the Mid North town as acts performed from Friday afternoon to Sunday afternoon.

Australian country music royalty featured on entertainment line-up, Sunday's with Anne Kirkpatrick drawing a huge crowd at the centre.

Anne is the daughter of the late country music

legend Slim Dusty.

Her son, Jim Arneman, also performed on the Sunday morning with his wife Flora Smith

He later joined his mother on the stage where, no doubt, they would have made their father and grandfather proud.

Anne said she had heard that the region was a heartland for Dusty fans.

Speaking to The Flinders News before taking to the stage on the Sunday, she said she was looking forward to singing some of her father and mother's songs to the crowd.

Saturday morning featured an abundance of future young stars as the festival's workshop and talent guest was held throughout the day.

Thirty entries were received across all sections and the winners were presented in the evening.

Tyler Paterson, of Port Pirie, and Ella Hebberman, of Jamestown, both featured prominently in the guest and picked up awards for their talents.

Member for Frome, and Minister for Regional Development, Geoff Brock, officially opened the festival on the Saturday night.

Mr Brock paid tribute to the event's hard-working committee which consists of Ian White, Joyce Wode, Marie Johnson, Anne Cowin, Irene Scott and Allan Woolford.

After the official opening, Peter Coad and the Coad Sisters hit the stage.

The Coads are familiar with country South Australia, originally hailing from the Far North. Their family lived at Martins Well

Lions Club of Rocky River news:

Hughes Street/Rocky River Cleanup:

At a Rocky River Lions Club meeting earlier this year it was suggested that Lions could initiate and organise a cleanup of an area of public land on the south side of the west bridge on the Hughes Street/Pirie road.

Following approval from Northern Areas Council, local residents were invited to attend a community working bee to clean up ash trees, pepper trees, weeds and timber that was untidy and likely to restrict the flow of the river in times of flooding. The response was good with various community members keen to help.

The first working bee was held on September 6th with Lions Simon Huckwell with his chainsaw and log splitter, Bevan Smith with his loader and John Kitto with his forklift tractor. With lots of helpers, by the end of the first day 68 hours of voluntary work had been expended. A track was reinstated to enable mowing equipment to access both sides of the dry creek bed without the need to cross the bridge.

More working bees were held on 20th, 22nd and 23rd September to clean up old logs and ash and olive trees and general tidying up of the area.

Further working bees will be needed to finish the tree trimming, establish small walking/bike tracks, aware that this area is prone to flooding.

Lions thank everyone who has helped so far. By this time next year this area will be an attractive place in our community and bring benefits we can all share. As they say, 'Watch this space!'

On Wednesday 30th August Hanley's Bus took our Club and a few members from Crystal Brook and Port Pirie to Holowiliena Station, via Craddock, for the day. It was a wonderful day, sun

shining, roos by hundreds and emus and chicks of all sizes.

Our hosts, the Warwick/Frahn families, met us with a cuppa and shared their history and showed us their recently renovated 150-year-old store, blacksmith, cellar and accommodation block. The family settled at Holowiliena in 1852 and have kept a lot of the equipment - sulkies, motorbikes, jars, holsters etc. After a pleasant lunch in the sun, we headed home disturbing the roos and emus again.

At the August Meeting, Len Cooper spoke of his trip to Africa with his wife and 3 family members. They travelled/camped 11,000kms through 9 countries from Cape Town to Nairobi in 6 weeks seeing zebras, elephants, baboons, monkeys, hippos, lions etc., also the Zambesi River, Victoria Falls, villages and of course country side. Looked a good trip.

Mary Ellen Kelly of Helping Hand was our Guest Speaker in September. Mary spoke of the changes to My Aged Care and getting services in the home as everything has changed since Feb 2017. When you need Care she suggested getting your Medicare card and a cuppa and ring My Aged Care and tell them your story as it is. It is hard to admit you need help but tell them what you can do and what you need help with. They will send out a Regional Assessment Carer who will assess your needs - it is often a good idea to have a family member or good friend with you for this visit. Later, My Age Care will offer either Basic Care or a Package with levels 1 to 4 and give you a list of Providers who can provide this Care (e.g. Helping Hand, Country Connect, Silver Chain etc.) - you then decide whom you prefer you then have 56 days to accept, otherwise the opportunity for Care goes back to My Age Care to be used elsewhere. Costs depend on the amount of Care you receive and your income - there is also a clause. Besides a Will, people need to think of having a Power of Attorney and an Advanced Care Directive. The future sounds so much fun (!!!) But it's good to hear and understand the current system.

We meet at 10am each month – all retirees welcomed. The October meeting is at the Laura Civic Centre and the Guest Speaker will be from the RAA talking about road rules.

November's meeting will be at the Wirrabara Sporting Reserve, the Guest Speakers will be Julie Arthur (Director of Nursing Booleroo/Laura) and Melissa

Koch (Country Connect Carers from Port Pirie).

LATEST NEWS:

Laura Streetscape Upgrade:

Council has been successful in obtaining funding for the redevelopment of the streetscape for the Eastern side of Herbert Street. The state government through its places for people program awarded Council \$230,000, which Council has matched with an allocation of \$230,000 to complete the works across the 2017/18 and 2018/19 financial years. Detailed designs are currently being developed with the works tentatively programmed for early 2018.

Laura Flood Mitigation Project:

These works are now complete insofar as the works subject to the grant and the scope identified under that project are complete. There are clearly a range of additional works required to connect and solve associated storm water management issues and a scope for these is being developed to implement and resolve.

Northern Areas Council Community Project Grants:

At the September Council meeting, Community Project Grants were allocated to groups from within the Laura District. The Laura Memorial Civic Centre were allocated \$2,300 toward a new stove and a range hood in the kitchen, the Rocky River Historic and Art Society was awarded \$935 toward the preservation of current art collections and to provide an honour roll, the Laura Folk Fair was allocated \$530 toward directional signage and the Rocky River Garden Club were allocated \$600 toward providing a guest speaker at a garden club event.

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LCDTA update:

Following on from our article in the August Laura Standard, we highlight further LCDTA improvements throughout the town.

Part 2 - Travellers heading north are greeted by the old-style shop façade at the information bay at the southern entrance of the town, which also features posts with hitching rings in reference to the days when the Kurrajong trees were used to hitch the horses. This project was completed in 2010 (with an incredible amount of volunteer hours) at a cost in excess of \$10,000.

The other three town entrances have more modern stvle sians featuring our iconic buildings. Designed and manufactured by a local resident, these unique signs can also be seen at night with the more recent addition of solar lighting. Solar lighting has also been installed at the Caravan Park



Our wide median strip is always mentioned in a positive light, the addition of the Gazebo with history boards and tables with seating see the area used frequently by tourists and locals alike. The relocation of the CJ Dennis statue and construction of the Pioneer Family add further interest to the median strip. Tourists can often be seen having their photo taken with the statues!

To coincide with the new main street footpath paving, all street furniture was painted prior to reinstallation and together with the al-fresco dining areas, protuberances to protect the historical Kurrajong trees, wine barrel planters and bin surrounds, this side of the street has undergone a wonderful transformation. We look forward to the upgrade on the eastern side in the near future.

One area of great beauty is the old Courthouse/Archives Historical Precinct. The installation of heritage Furphy lighting, paving and fencing in 2010 amounting to \$12,000 along with the lace-work seating have highlighted these wonderful heritage buildings. Historians and locals alike are pleased to see the buildings so well preserved. This area has also hosted a local wedding, special celebrations and many photo opportunities.



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Another fairly major project from LCDTA is the Laura Information Centre, opened in November 2005 with 36,830 recorded visitors since opening. Over the years the variety of stock has increased as has the number of brochures for planning your next holiday. The window display is always changing and often highlights current town happenings. The LIC is now self-funded but appreciates occasional donations from the Laura Racecourse Management committee.

Many changes have taken place in the Laura Caravan Park. Most notable is the new reception building which now affords the Park managers privacy in their own home. The camp kitchen is very popular and the rock wall entrances are a magnificent display of an almost lost skill in stonemasonry. More recently the showers and laundry have been upgraded. We have a resident family of Emus, sculpted by David Griffiths from Adelaide, who also created CJ Dennis and the Pioneer Family.

Looking forward, our future projects include; the War Memorial backdrop, the rejuvenation of the median strip plantings and a new shelter with table and seating at the Beetaloo Valley Lookout. The rest area at the western bridge entrance will be receiving a makeover with the assistance of the Lions Club of Rocky River.

Then and Now:

Banking in Laura


In recent times rural communities across Australia have bemoaned the loss of onsite banking services as the banks ride the technology wave to its full extent. But it is not just rural Australia that is feeling the effects of the disappearance of face-to-face banking; other countries including the Philippines and Canada are facing the same dilemma.

Although we don't like it, this could be termed 'just another transition' comparable to other industries. Remember that Laura used to have a flour mill, a brewery, a railway connection and several machinery manufacturers. Losing any of these was dramatic at the time.

In 1874 agencies of the National Bank of Australasia Ltd (Georgetown Branch) and the Bank of South Australia (Gladstone Branch) opened in Laura on the same day. This reflected the vitality of commerce at the time, somewhat similar to the private railway companies which were springing up across Britain and America.

A few years later the Bank of SA purchased a residence and commissioned their architect Edmund Wright (also responsible for Edmund Wright House in King William Street) to prepare specifications for alterations. The banking chamber of what has until recently been known as Creative Treasures was added in 1922. The Bank of SA was absorbed into the Union Bank in 1892. Another corporate merger with the Bank of Australasia saw the formation of the ANZ Bank in 1951.

During the 1890s The National Bank erected new premises (now owned by Marius Venz) and in the early 1900s the ES&A Bank opened on the other side of the street, until taking over the National Bank premises until closing the branch in 1941. After this the ES&A maintained an agency of their Appila Branch in the former office of solicitor WJ Stockdale, now part of the Little Woodfired Pizza Shop.



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An unsung son of our district

Not really unsung, but not well known in our district, Associate Professor Jack Cross grew up on the family farm on the Appila Plain, near Stone Hut. Born in 1930 Jack attended the Stone Hut school and the Pine Creek Lutheran Day School prior to boarding at Immanuel College in Adelaide.

In 2013 Jack was recognized in the Australia Day Honours list, as a Member (AM) of the Order of Australia. The citation stated, "for significant service to tertiary education in South Australia, particularly in the field of art and design, and to Indigenous education".

That really was a very brief summary of the life of Jack, who although 'retired' still lectures at the Adelaide School of Art. Having studied for his Masters at Stanford University in USA, Jack played a major role in the establishment of the Adelaide School of Aboriginal Education, during the 1970s, and trained Indigenous teachers in the Anangu communities. He published the book, *Schooling, The Conflict of Belief*.

As Head of School of Education, at Underdale Campus, University of SA, 1969-1989, and as Adjunct Associate Professor, Schools of Education and Art, Architecture and Design, University of South Australia, Jack has been an inspiration to many a student teacher, resulting in receiving a Distinguished Teaching Award in 2015.

As President of Friends of South Australia's Archives, a Member of the Consultative Forum of National Archives, and a Life Member of U3A Adelaide, Jack keeps a keen eye on activities in these areas of interest. He was awarded Life Membership of the Workers' Educational Association of South Australia, for his service as a tutor and board member. He also compiled the history of the WEA.

He received the Chief Minister's Award, 2012, for his book, *Great Central State: the foundation of the Northern Territory*. This treatise on the early days of the Northern Territory was the product of virtually a lifetime of research; being the result of forty years of sustained effort (five years fulltime) and is hailed as the largest research project on a South Australian history topic since Douglas Pike's, *Paradise of Dissent*.

Jack has recently added to his published works with the launch of *Two Crosses*, a family story reflecting the social history of life when the Cross family lived around the Armagh and Bungaree Station area near Clare in the 1880s. Jack recently received a Highly Commended Award in the Genealogy SA Family History Book Awards for *Two Crosses*. His brother Trevor (now in WA) was also involved in the production of *Two Crosses*.
