

The Courthouse Gallery:

Art Exhibition Opening Friday night of Folk Fair Weekend:

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The Significance of the Laura Folk Fair to our District:

In 1980 Dick Biles, inaugural President of Rocky River Historic & Art Society, conceived the idea of the Folk Fair as an added attraction to the Laura Art Prize which had commenced a year earlier. The first Folk Fair was organised by RRHAS and included the unveiling of the bust of CJ Dennis which had been commissioned by the society. Since 1981 the Laura Folk Fair Committee has organised the fair. Since then the Folk Fair has developed from a fledgling event to that of a significant regional tourism attraction which has done much to put Laura on the map.

The Adelaide Cup was recognised with a 'one off' public holiday in 1973 to commemorate its centenary. But it ultimately has become a permanent holiday on our South Australian calendar. Through the years many opinions have been expressed about the relevance of this public holiday. The attendance a few weeks ago at Morphettville of only 13,600 has again provoked consideration.

Here in Laura, some have memories of the meetings of our own Laura Races which during the heydays drew crowds of 10,000 to the Easter meetings, earning it the reputation of 'The Onkaparinga of the North'. In 1928 the South Australian Railways erected a platform near the racecourse for the convenience of race goers who came by special trains.

Below is an extract from a recent Letter to the Editor of *The Advertiser*.

"Perhaps we could have public holiday for the 40th annual Laura Folk Fair, which will on the first weekend of April attracted several thousand more attendees than did the recent Adelaide Cup at Morphettville. For a township of about 600 this is a remarkable feat.

Laura also punches above its weight academically and industrially.

NAPLAN results (The Advertiser 27/2/19) showed Laura Primary School as the only non metropolitan school in the top listed schools for both reading and numeracy, whilst Golden North ice cream is sold throughout Australia and even exported to China.

Laura is one of many rural towns with proud and significant contributions to our state. Like most towns, its hospital was originally built entirely from local funds. It's way past time to get beyond the Gepps Cross syndrome which too often dominates our government thinking and give more recognition to these smaller communities — even if just for the fun and frivolity of the Folk Fair.

Laura and Districts Probus Club news:

We've now had two Meetings after a break over Christmas and New Year. Both Meetings were held at the Laura Civic Centre.

In February the Guest Speaker was John Van Ruth, the CEO of Operation Flinders. John spoke of their work with teens, between the ages of 14 & 18, who are chosen to go on an adventure camp to Yankinnia Station in the Flinders Ranges for a 100km trek over 8 days. The teens chosen are selected as they have 3 of 6 risks factors – disengagement from education or employment, anti-social behavior, offending, family dysfunction or social and economic disadvantage. The goal of Operation Flinders is to improve self-esteem, reduce offending and support the youths to achieve their full potential. 34% of their funding is from Corporate or Individuals, 29% from the State Government but they are reliant on volunteers.

Operation Flinders was formed 27 years ago. 50-60 Schools participate. The camps are held 5 times a year with 12 teams of 10 teens plus volunteers. The camps are aimed at being fun but also increasing the teens' esteem and sense of responsibility. The Camps are followed up with support & a 3-month activity & Certificate. Successful Youths can move on to a Mentor program. Studies have shown that Operation Flinders goals for participants are being met.

In March we held our AGM with Gladstone people this year being the Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer and Laura people being the 'vice squad'. Final details for the Probus Picnic were also discussed.

The picnic is to be held at the Laura Sporting Complex on April Fool's Day!!! Probus Members from Orroroo, Peterborough and Jamestown will be attending – approx. 80 members all told. Amongst the items will be the Laura School and the Crystal Singers from the 'Brook.


attendance. Everyone welcome.



LUTHERAN Loss – and other things.

It's hard to comprehend what loss is like until you actually experience it in an immediate and personal way.

Loss has at it's core that there is an empty space in your life that was once occupied – let alone the trauma of the actual event that caused the loss to occur in the first place.

The situation in Christchurch NZ at this time is significant in that loss is far deeper than just a passing event of life. It touches the very core of what it is to value the very things that make our life valuable. One person said they had chosen to live in New Zealand because he thought of it as a beautiful and peaceful place – that has now been lost by the trauma of the event and it's resulting loss of lives and life altering injury to many others.

The whole community in the process suffers loss of what was once the 'normal' routine of everyday life. Freedoms once taken for granted are now questioned. One is caused to re-evaluate the framework of one's life, and in the process grieves what once was is no longer the norm – a shadow has been cast over those things which we have always appreciated as the central to living a happy and peaceful life – there is a loss.

For those in more mature years, is the whittling away of what has been valued through a long life and a great concern for the next generations – knowing that things will never be the same for our children and our children's children – again a loss.

Where to out of all this? We see the great rallying around of the community in all it's levels of grief and loss. Sharing in and identifying with the loss, the community can be a great comfort that the loss is mutual and will not leave those in this position alone in their suffering. This has often been the Australian experience as well through the many tragedies and traumas we have experienced as a nation, through fire, flood and drought.

One underlying resource is always in reach – compassion. The stories of the Bible often recount that the one feature that drew people to Jesus is that He had compassion for people – He went the journey with them.

We would do well to do likewise – otherwise we all become lost and alone.
