When Laura had a Newspaper

The Laura Standard was established in 1888 as a limited liability company. Because of difficulties in obtaining machinery the first issue was not printed until 11 April 1889. It seems that corporate takeovers are nothing new as the business was sold in 1889 and then again in 1892 to WJC Cole who had undergone his apprenticeship to the printing trade with the Kapunda Herald. Mr Cole was a member of the state parliament in the House of Assembly and later sold the enterprise to a former employee Edward Farrell who in turn sold to RJ Rose in 1913. The business continued with Mr Rose as editor/proprietor until his death in 1942 when it was taken over by the Northern Review of Jamestown which later became part of the Flinders News consortium in Port Pirie. During the 1940s and 50s Tom and Doug Scott continued a printing business in the same premises which are now occupied by CocoLaura.

Throughout its life the *Laura Standard* was produced weekly, normally as a broadsheet, but in smaller format during the Second World War when paper was difficult to acquire. JA Hill was a regular contributor from the inception of the paper in 1889 until his death in 1904, when he was eulogized as "being a sturdy champion of local interests, fearlessly expressing his opinions". His column often entered into altercation with the editor of the *Areas Express* of Gladstone – perhaps that may have been the beginnings of inter town rivalry.

Reuben Rose used his paper to advocate strongly for fire prevention and was first secretary of the Northern Fire Fighting Association. He used his printing presses to produce fire prevention posters, stickers and blotters, and once printed the *Laura Standard* in red ink to give leverage to his passion. The headstone on his grave in the Laura Cemetery was erected by the Northern Fire Fighting Association as attribute to his passionate advocacy.

The Laura Standard from 1889-1942 can be accessed on microfilm at the State Library of SA and the Laura Archives. This was funded by Rocky River Historic & Art Society as a major project in the early 1980s.





Who IS the Man



After all the waiting and preparations for Christmas, suddenly we're into a new year. Many of us have entered 2022 with questions. Perhaps even some anxiety. Will this year be as challenging as the past few have been, or are there glimmers of hope on the horizon? In the midst of so much uncertainty, is there an anchor that can keep us steady in whatever storms we might face this year?

I'm reminded of a story I told a group of Laura Primary children a few years ago. Jesus and his friends are in a fishing boat on the Sea of Galilee. It's been a long day and Jesus is tired. So he grabs a pillow, finds a quiet corner and immediately falls asleep. Meanwhile an unexpected and violent storm blows up. Jesus' friends are experienced fishermen who are used to unpredictable weather, but this is no ordinary storm. And they're terrified. They rush to Jesus and shake him awake. Jesus opens his eyes, stretches and stands up. With quiet authority he speaks to the storm and the waves: "Peace! Be still!" Suddenly, all is quiet. The wind, the waves, are calm. The children entered the story with great enthusiasm. They yawned loudly as Jesus grabbed his pillow and lay down. They out-snored each other as Jesus fell into a deep sleep. And at the top of their lungs they cried out to the wind and the waves: "STORM, STOP!!"

After the story was over, we talked about the way that Jesus cared for his friends in the midst of that storm. As he does for all of us. As we enter 2022 he's with us in our own stormy times - financial, relationship, health, grief.

After the crisis is over Jesus' friends ask each other a question. "Who IS this man?" they wonder, "Even the wind and the waves obey him!" Ultimately, they conclude he's the Son of God. The Saviour of the world. It's a question we're all asked. Who IS this man? What will we conclude?
