Northern Areas Council Australia Day Awards 2023



Northern Areas Council Mayor Scarman advised that the recipients of the 2023 Northern Areas Council Australia Day Awards were acknowledged at an Australia Day Breakfast at Memorial Park, Jamestown on Thursday the 26th of January 2023.

The Citizen of the Year for 2023 awarded to Mr Leith Cooper of Jamestown.

Leith has been a highly valued contributor to not only the Jamestown community, but the wider region for several decades. Leith's contribution has extended from community and sporting organisations, local history and various historical celebrations, through to education and key leadership roles in the agricultural industry.

Mid North Suicide Prevention has been awarded the Active Citizenship Award for the highly successful Jamestown Golf Course Park Run. The success of the Jamestown Park Run in encouraging better health and wellbeing, in addition to volunteering has seen it duly recognised for their outstanding efforts.

The Community Event of the Year is the Laura 150 year celebrations, which took place across the October long weekend.

Over eighteen hundred people celebrated the sesquicentenary of the town of Laura, with people travelling from as far as interstate for the celebrations. Festivities included a parade from the Civic Centre to the Oval, where stalls and community activities were held, followed by a cabaret style dinner and band in the evening.

The Sunday saw over two hundred people attend a "back to school roll call" at the Laura Primary School, as well as the unveiling of the vintage stump puller at the site of the former foundary where it was built over a century earlier and the unveiling of the Laura Hughes glass etching between the Courthouse and Archives buildings.

For their hard work coordinating the celebrations, the Laura 150 Committee have been recognised as Council's Community Event of the Year.

The Three Kings

In the Eastern Orthodox Church, Christmas is celebrated twelve days later, on the Feast of the Epiphany, the coming of Light to the world, and the part played by the three kings.



We're not sure whether these three were kings or wise men. I'd like to think that they were both, or at least they began as kings, but gathered much wisdom along the way.

So these eastern kings started out, saddlebags loaded with gold, to find this new king with the bright star as their guide, sure that they would find him in a splendid palace, and broker an alliance, beneficial to them.

The journey was long and arduous, with wild dogs, fractious camels and sand storms to cope with. After a while they began to realise that this new king was protecting them in some way, that he might be a mediator between a god and themselves. So they used some of their gold to buy incense from a passing caravan, a worthy gift for a priest, to present to him in his temple.

Later they visited King Herod in Jerusalem. He offered to help them, and asked them to return to him after they had found the child, so that he also could pay him homage. But, being kings themselves, they could read between the lines, and knew that he would never tolerate any possible opposition to his own power. In fact, he would set out to find and kill this new king.

So, with heavy hearts, they used some more of their gold to buy myrrh, the spice used to prepare the dead for burial.

They eventually found the child and his parents in, of all places, a stable they had to stoop to enter. They laid the gifts before him, then tickled his tummy and talked baby talk to him. Then they left for home, avoiding Jerusalem and Herod.

Later, around a camp fire, when they reflected on their long, difficult journey, they realised that it had given them time to understand that their own quest for power was not all that different from Herod's, and made it possible for them to recognise the immense power of love found in a helpless, defenceless child, which had broken down all their defences. They had sought a grand palace, then a temple, but found instead a doorway they had to bend low to enter.

And so it was that these three, who had left home as kings, returned as wise men. Blessings for the new year.
