

LIONS NEWS

The purpose of Lions clubs is to promote the principles of good citizenship, to take an active interest in the civic, cultural, social, and moral welfare of our communities, and to unite the clubs in the bonds of friendship, good fellowship, and mutual understanding.

In doing so, Lions International has adopted what is referred to as the 7 Pillars Project. These are the 7 main causes that Lions clubs worldwide see as priorities in our world today.

DIABETES -1.5 million Australians, or 5.6% of our population, are living with diabetes; 283 people are diagnosed every day. This disease can lead to serious health issues affecting the heart and blood vessels, eyes, kidneys, nerves, and teeth. Diabetes is the leading cause of heart disease, blindness, kidney failure, and lower limb amputations, and for young people, living with diabetes is challenging, not only physically but also emotionally.

The Lions Australia Diabetes Foundation funded grants totalling \$58,602 for care packs, nursing practitioner training, imaging equipment, and ongoing research projects for the year ending June 2024. Since 1994, the Foundation has provided \$1,123.420 in grants.

In Addition, Lions International provided USD \$60,000 to St Vincents Institute for Imaging Equipment in 2024, which cost over \$265,000.

CHILDHOOD CANCER – Lions Clubs aim to fund research to eradicate childhood cancer once and for all.

Since 1996, Lions Australia has contributed \$12 million to childhood cancer research. The Australian Childhood Cancer Research Foundation (ALCCRF) was officially established in 2009, with the prime focus of increasing childhood cancer survival rates by supporting research efforts not just here in Australia but around the world.

The ALCCRF currently supports eight Universities and Medical Research Institutions in advanced research programmes, details of which are reported on the foundation's website.

Lions International Foundation also contributes to cancer research in Australia with multi-million-dollar support of the Garvan Institute in Sydney

YOUTH—Lions cater for our young people in Clubs called Leos. There are 7,000 Leos clubs worldwide, with 120 Clubs in Australia. Lions Clubs also sponsor Youth of the Year, open to all senior high school students, to encourage and foster leadership skills and public speaking.

ENVIRONMENT- Lions Clubs have long championed the environment. With 1.3 million members worldwide, lions have a powerful voice. In 2011, then International President Wing-Kum Tam of Hong Kong challenged Lions Clubs to plant 1 million trees. They responded by planting 15 million across every inhabited continent and have planted many millions more since.

Currently, over 3000 projects are carried out by Australian clubs every year. These projects come in many forms, from community clean-ups, tree planting, promoting recycling, and wetland reconstructions. These projects are aimed at improving air, water, and land quality as well as protecting our flora and fauna.

HUNGER—Foodbank, in a report to the government, stated that 15% of Australians experienced food insecurity at least once in the past 12 months. The WHO reports that 10% of the world's population goes hungry every day. Lions provide grants to support school-based feeding programs, support food banks, provide education programs to support healthy living and support improved farming practices in poorer nations around the world. Lions at the club level deliver meals to the elderly and disabled and provide funding and volunteers in soup kitchens and homeless shelters.

HUMANITARIAN EFFORTS – Every day, Lions work to empower clubs, volunteers, and partners to improve the health and well-being of our communities.

Lions provide grants to help people living with disabilities to lead more independent and productive lives.

Co-fund with the Government to secure vaccines for home and abroad, donate to expand nursing homes, hospices, and facilities for the elderly, and provide funding for clean water and improved sanitation in under-developed nations.

DISASTER AID – Australia, the land of fire and flood, has been a net beneficiary of worldwide assistance from Lions Clubs globally. Wherever disaster presents itself, you will find the footprint of Lions, whether volunteers working tirelessly in clean-ups or funding assistance to those left without. Within hours of the L A fires Lions Clubs responded to calls for money, food, clothing and accommodation help for those affected.

As a relative newcomer to Lions, I do get intense satisfaction knowing that Lions make a difference. However, it is your support, whether by buying donuts at the footy, Lions mints, cakes and puddings at Christmas, or your donations of cash or grain samples, that allows us to do what we do, so it's a big thank you from us at Lions.

Artists and their Art Forms

Painters Julie Bottrall and Jackson Fudge.

A family affair – Painters: Julie Bottrall and her grandson Jackson Fudge. Julie is affectionately known as Guggy by her grandchildren. Julie's medium of choice is watercolour paints while Jackson's is acrylics. They are both past recipients of the "Dick Biles Emerging Artist Award". The prize is given to an emerging local artist each year at the Laura Art Show. Julie was awarded her prize in 2019 and Jackson 5 years later in 2024.

Julie returned to creating art after attending a watercolour painting course at the Port Pirie TAFE, after many years of not picking up a brush. She laughs as she recalls the reason why she stopped making her art.....As a child of about seven years she remembers sitting at the kitchen table drawing with her brother Jeff (Morgan) and her mother saying "Jeff's is better than yours." Many decades later, as an adult Julie realised that it was an unfair comparison as she was younger by 3 years!!

Julie describes her process of watercolour painting as water with a little paint added. She then applies the diluted paint to the sheet of paper in sections, often starting at the top of the paper (eg sky). She adds more water to her paint to thin it. Julie explains that it is necessary to paint with the lightest colours of the painting first as watercolour paint is transparent, allowing her to paint darker sections over top without concerns of the colours mixing. The example given here is adding leaves to an area of sky. You will see from her paintings included here that Julie paints a range of images - landscapes and foliage from trees and flowers to buildings and gateposts! Her award-winning painting was of a rose. She is pictured with Dick Biles' daughter Kimberly on page 15.

To prepare for painting, paper is soaked with water (Julie often uses the bath to soak her paper) and stretched onto the backboard and taped in place. It must be dry before starting to paint. Paper is generally available in 3 textures, rough, medium and smooth. Julie found that the paint "bled" on the smooth paper and so no longer uses it.

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Julie taught Jackson how to paint with watercolours when he was very young, but he soon graduated to acrylics and is now dabbling in oil painting. Many of Jackson's paintings were on exhibition in the Port Pirie Regional Art Gallery as part of the recent Youth Exhibition. He has previously exhibited his work at the Gladstone Annual Art Exhibition as well as the Laura Art Show.

Jackson described the preparation of a canvas as stretching the canvas fabric over a wooden frame and tightening it into place. He is currently working with acrylics and experimenting with colour and shape plus occasionally layering other medium into his work. You will notice in the photos the use of beads and not so obviously the use of oil pastels and spray paints. When working with acrylics Jackson spoke about starting with what is most distant in the work, before painting closer objects.

He explained that acrylics dry like rubber and therefore light colours can be added over dark, unlike watercolours.

Jackson is pictured with his award-winning painting. His first sale was at

the 2024 Laura Art Show.







Annual Art Exhibition

Entries are invited for the Laura Art Exhibition held annually in conjunction with the Laura Fair. This year will be our 48th annual exhibition. Entry forms for artists will be available at the Laura Information Centre and the Laura Fair website. As in recent years the 'opening' of the exhibition will be a twilight event with doors of the gallery open from 5pm on the Friday of the Laura Fair,

The Junior Art section for students of Gladstone High School and the feeder primary schools is always a popular place for families to visit. Much of the entertainment for children will now be staged on the eastern side of the Courthouse Gallery, so the student art will be in close vicinity. We especially welcome helpers at the gallery over the weekend – just a stint for an hour or more at the door, welcoming visitors and taking donations for entry isn't very hard, and can be a pleasant respite from the action of the fair outside – or the sun!

Laura Archives

We quietly continue to sort and tidy our expanding collection, and always welcome more items for the archives. Many families have items stashed in cupboards or sheds that may relate to Laura, especially businesses in the past. Calendars and give-a-ways from businesses such as the butchers, bakers, Mr Lehmann's shoe shop, the delis, the garages and the Laura Mill are of significance.

We have recently acquired a tiny notebook about 7x10cms (complete with tiny pencil) (picture on page 23) from the S.A. Import Co which operated in Herbert Street until being destroyed by fire in 1926. The following year Eudunda Farmers

Co-op opened a new store on the site which is now the Laura IGA. The SA Import Co was a Laura business, but this item says Laura and Melrose! The main street was looking pretty smart then as Mr Humphris had erected a new building designed by architect Firmin Jenkins of Port Pirie as a Ford dealership – later known as Laura Motor Garage. 
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We are also endeavouring to collect past publications of the **Rocky River Riter's Group**, as many of the submissions in these booklets dating back to the 1990s relate to aspects of life, or people, of the district. Such items will be interesting resources in years to come when family historians are looking for personal aspects of the lives of their predecessors.
