As many of you are now aware, the LCDTA has been working behind the scenes researching and exploring a new aged-care model for our town. This concept was introduced to us a few months ago, and we were fortunate to hear from speakers and presenters who shared how this model transformed a small country town in WA. We feel it could greatly benefit Laura and create valuable job opportunities—particularly important as Golden North's departure will leave a gap in our employment sector.

The main goal of this model is to allow our elderly residents to remain in their homes and stay within the community they love. The proven success and economic benefits seen elsewhere are very encouraging.

On Tuesday 11th November, Mable presented two sessions at the Sporting Reserve to explain the model in more detail and highlight how it could support our town. The day was a resounding success, with more than 80 people attending.

#### Laura Archives

The article about Golden North and the 'Tyranny of Distance' in a recent Laura Standard has resulted in the need to enlarge on other businesses in Laura which have taken advantage or overcome the 'tyranny of distance' in the past – more to follow in future issues of The Laura Standard.

Meanwhile, it's important to know that history in general is not stagnant as new aspects of the past continue to surface, nor is the Laura Archives static.

Within the past few weeks there have been three interesting developments relating to the past, and the early connections to the Bowker family and the Laura Ice Co.

From an auction in Adelaide we purchased a 1938 bank cheque. From the Clare branch of the English Scottish & Australian Bank the Clare Ice & Cold Stores cheque also bore the Iogo of the Laura Ice & Produce Co Ltd. It is known that the Clare Ice and Cool Store opened in 1927 but this 1938 cheque which bears the signature of Mrs Hazel Bowker instigated further research. The Northern Argus newspaper of Clare had two adverts for this enterprise in Autumn 1938, nothing in 1937 or 1939.

The 1927 operation was established by Mr W Ogilvie of Kingswood, father of W Ogilvie who operated the Clare Motor Garage, agent for Citroen and Nash cars. Frank Knappstein was manager of the new cool store. It's unknown when the Bowker family became involved or for how long, and if indeed it was a continuing enterprise. The lack of later adverts could indicate that WWII may have curtailed the operation. Incidentally, in this earlier time neither business had a



telephone number listed, although the Clare Motor Garage did as it also advertised the only breakdown service in the district 'anytime, anywhere'.

From a second-hand shop in Adelaide we purchased a few of the special Golden North 2 litre ice cream tins continued next page ...

which were produced in the 1980s as a limited run, probably to commemorate the sixtieth anniversary of ice cream production. These collectibles may be auctioned sometime, perhaps at the Folk Fair. Keep your ears and eyes open!



Just last week a portrait photo of Percival Bowker and his wife Mary Ellen who married in 1903 was presented to the Laura Archives. Percy born in 1877 was the son of William Bowker, stone mason and dairyman who started sending scalded cream on the train to Broken Hill in the early 1880s.

Percy continued and expanded the enterprise, forming the Laura Ice Co in 1923.

#### "Staying In Place" – Mable in Laura



On Tuesday 11th November Linda and Brad from

Mable came to Laura to talk to interested parties about Laura setting itself up with the Staying in Place model. Over 80 people attended the two sessions which was certainly enough for the steering group to now make this happen.

Staying in Place is all about caring for people with Aged Care packages using local people to supply the services. No longer wasted money with the worker charging for travel time from, for instance, Pirie and back to deliver the service. This means the money from your package stays in the Laura district.

This model can be a huge benefit to our community both financially and socially. Like the name says, it keeps people staying in place and our place is Laura.

If you have a few hours or more per week you could perhaps become a service provider. Providers can be health care workers but they can also supply services like cleaning, gardening and support for social outings. These are just a couple of services.

If you have time and would like to earn some money please consider becoming a part of this model. Time can be as little as a couple of hours per week to maybe full time. With your own ABN you can be set up and ready to start basic training in readiness to start work. Mable will do the training and a lot of the paperwork for you and they cover insurances plus income protection.

If you couldn't get to the sessions on the 11th and are currently on a package, think your package needs updating, think you need to be on a package, could be looking to get into that space soon or interested in being a service provider please contact Sue Scarman on 0418 844 935.

#### **Volunteering**

#### What is volunteering and why is it important?

- "Without financial gain": Volunteers do not receive payment for their time. While they may be reimbursed for out-of-pocket expenses like travel, they are not employees and do not expect to be paid for their work.

Laura & Districts Branch have been delivering meals since 1979, in just over three years we will be 50 years of age, what a great milestone.

What a unique branch we are, three towns – Georgetown, Gladstone and Laura.

One Chair currently revolving, One secretary, Three Client Service Co-ordinators and Three Volunteer Service Co-ordinators. We meet four times a year, a September AGM with an Awardee Presentation Afternoon Tea. Everyone is Welcome.

This year we celebrated the milestone of 12 Volunteers – 5 Five-year; 2 Ten-year and 5 Twenty-year Life Members. Congratulations.

We are so very lucky to have 69 committed Volunteers, 4 of whom are active Inaugural Volunteers - 46 years and still delivering, chatting and checking. We are a group, very focused on the wellbeing of our community Clients, "Chat and Check" being crucial. Should anyone of our Clients look to be not quite themselves, we are able to report to the RN on duty of our concern which is then followed up.

#### New Aged Care Act – A summary

1<sup>st</sup> November 2025, Australia's New Aged Care Act came into effect. Meals on Wheels SA Volunteers are now part of the aged care workforce and share responsibility for helping Clients live safely, with dignity and respect.

#### What this means for Volunteers

- The Aged Care Code of Conduct applies to everyone, including Volunteers.
- Each Client has a new Statement of Rights that Volunteers must uphold.

- Volunteers will be supported with information and refresher training to understand what this means in everyday service.
- Volunteers are protected under new Whistleblower laws, so can safely raise any concerns.
- Volunteers will continue to play an essential role in supporting nutrition, safety, and social connection.

#### Laura Community Caravan Park

The Caravan Park functions with three interdependent groups, -committee, managers and volunteers. As the managers work with a contract; this article will focus on the committee and volunteers.

The committee is a group of volunteers who meet monthly and are responsible for the oversight and improvement of the caravan park. Another of its roles is the selection, guidance and support of the managers. Thirdly it provides sponsorship of organisations within the Laura Community. As a committee within the LCDTA structure it provides monthly reports to the LCDTA.



Hi, my name is Natalya and I've recently come on board with the *Drought Recovery Program* at UnitingSA, rolled out as part of the State Government's \$73.4 Million dollar drought package. I'm here to assist communities across the **Yorke and Northern regions in South Australia**, as people continue to navigate the challenges of drought and rural life.

I come from a background in mental health, running my own businesses, being a carer, and obtaining University qualifications in Human Services – academically, professionally, and personally – and I've also spent time living and working rurally- presently just out of Melrose – so I understand firsthand how tough things can get when the land is dry, the challenges are many, and it's easy to feel like you're carrying it all on your own.

I'm reaching out to let you know about a free, confidential wellbeing service that's here to support *anyone* impacted by drought-directly or indirectly. Support is tailored to each person's needs and this can include:

- A listening ear and practical strategies for wellbeing
- Strengthening relationships at home or in the community
- · Connecting individuals with local services and networks
- Support navigating grants, subsidies, and financial counselling
- Navigating health care and other government agencies
- And a whole lot more

While I cover the Yorke and Northern regions, UnitingSA has staff supporting other drought-affected regions including:
